Dear Pointe-Claire citizens,

In mid-March, we launched our new, user-friendly website.

The newly redesigned website contains all pertinent information on the City's activities and services offered to citizens and visitors.

The new website includes interactive maps of City buildings, outdoor pools and schools, all of which can easily be located throughout the City. Internet users will also be able to subscribe to City newsletters, and a calendar of events is also available to keep you informed of the City's events – whether they are of a sports, leisure, or cultural nature. In addition, the website features a powerful search engine as well as a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) section. A video portraying the City of Pointe-Claire is also featured on the homepage.

The City is taking its first steps into the world of social media. The official Twitter account @Pointe_Claire is already in use. We want to reach out to both young and old alike and inform them of the activities that the City offers – whether it is sports, cultural, or family events and much more.

HOUSING PROJECTS

Several housing developments will take place in the near future – a sign that our City continues to grow!

The Quartier Greenwich, at the extremity of Paprican Avenue, will propose 746 housing units (multifamily, duplex and townhouses) over a development period of seven years. The first phase called Square Equinox, whose construction will commence this summer, will consist of three buildings of eight floors each for a total of 220 units. The second phase will follow in 2014 and will comprise a total of 160 duplexes and townhouses.

Les Cours Portsmouth project is already underway on the avenue bearing its name and will consist of a total of 26 semidetached single-family homes. The Domaine Hermitage project, on Hermitage Avenue, consists of a housing development of 36 co-ownership townhouses, while the Ventura Condominium, facing Fairview Shopping Centre, will be composed of 228 housing units in four buildings. The H1 Harmony project on Hymus Boulevard, close to Delmar Avenue, will consist of five condominium buildings of 227 units in total.

This is a clear indication that the City of Pointe-Claire and its residential sector are growing at a fast pace!



OUTDOOR POOLS

With the warm weather around the corner, I invite you to look into registering your family at one of our seven outdoor pools in order to take advantage of the beautiful weather in the water! A group of volunteers works diligently every day to ensure that the pools are in good working order. Thanks to all our volunteers!

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL OWNERS OF RESIDENTIAL BUILDINGS:

Prior to the issuance of a building permit, an application for any significant alteration, extension, construction or demolition project must be reviewed by the Planning Advisory Committee and by City Council **in accordance with the objectives and criteria** stipulated in the *Site Planning and Architectural Integration Programme By-Law* (SPAIP By-Law PC-2787) and, when applicable, the *By-Law Respecting the Demolition of Immovables* (By-Law PC-2718).

This procedure can take several months. It is therefore important to be properly informed and to undertake the steps required well in advance of the projected date for the commencement of the project. Doing so will allow you to prepare all of the required documents within the allotted timeframe to avoid any unnecessary delays.

We encourage you to contact the Planning Department technician responsible for your neighbourhood as soon as your project starts to take form.

MECHANICAL EQUIPMENT (INCLUDING HEAT PUMPS, CENTRAL AIR UNITS, POOL FILTERS, ETC.)

Before installing any type of mechanical equipment, a certificate of authorisation must be obtained. The installation of any mechanical equipment can be a noise inconvenience to your neighbours. Nuisance bylaw 1495 limits the noise level of a heat pump to a maximum of 50 decibels.

CHOOSING A CONTRACTOR

When you are undertaking work that requires a contractor, the following steps should be taken to prevent problems:

 Prepare your plans and specifications or, if necessary, hire a professional.

- Obtain quotations from 2 or 3 contractors.
- Verify that the contractor has a valid licence from the Régie du bâtiment du Québec at 514-873-0976 or consult their website at www.rbq.gouv.qc.ca.
- Ensure that details of the work to be carried out by the contractor are indicated on the contract before signing.
- Inspect the project with the contractor and advise him of any deviations from the original contract before making the final payment.

Should you have any problems or further questions, please contact the contractor's customer service.

CONSTRUCTION CODES IN FORCE AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY REGULATION

The 2005 edition of the National Building Code, Chapter 1 Québec, for governed buildings was adopted on May 17, 2008. The City of Pointe-Claire also adopted the same regulation for small non-governed buildings on June 1st, 2011. Additional provisions are stipulated in Pointe-Claire's Construction by-law PC-2786. Furthermore, on August 1st, 2012, the Government of Québec adopted new regulations on energy efficiency.

INFORMATION BROCHURES

PLANNING AN EXTENSION TO YOUR HOME? ADDING A DECK OR INSTALLING A POOL? Before undertaking your home renovation project, it is important to contact a technician at the Planning Department to verify if a building permit or a certificate of authorisation is required.

For your information, the following projects are examples of work that would require either a permit or certificate of authorisation:

Fence, deck, permanent or temporary swimming pools (above- and in-ground), heat pump, antenna, satellite dish (with a diameter greater than 60 cm [2']), accessory building (garages, sheds, etc.), interior and exterior renovations (including garage conversion), extensions, demolition.

PLANNING SOME CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS?

Due to the large number of building permit and certificate of authorisation applications, the Planning Department requests that applications for all projects be submitted well in advance in order to avoid any unnecessary delays.


As per articles 3.3 and 4.3 of Permits and Certificates by-law PC-2788, the fees charged for issuing a certificate of authorisation or a building permit **ARE PAYABLE UPON FILING OF THE APPLICATION** and are calculated in accordance with the rates in effect. Please note that cheques should be made payable to: Ville de Pointe-Claire.

WE REMIND YOU THAT YOU MUST ALLOW **THREE TO FOUR WEEKS** TO RECEIVE YOUR BUILDING PERMIT OR CERTIFICATE OF AUTHORISATION. All applications are reviewed as quickly as possible, on a "first come, first served" basis once **all the necessary documents** have been received. To ensure that you have all the documents required for your application to maintain your priority, please consult the "**How To...**" information brochures available at the reception area of City Hall or from the Planning Department. They are also available on the City of Pointe-Claire website at www.ville.pointe-claire.qc.ca, under "Planning Department". They may also be sent by mail, fax or e-mail.

EXISTING HEDGES IN THE TRIANGLE OF VISIBILITY ON CORNER LOT PROPERTIES

We require the cooperation of all corner lot property owners whose existing hedges are situated in the triangle of visibility. The Planning Department receives complaints on a regular basis concerning this matter.

Article 5. 5 i) of Zoning by-law PC-2775 allows hedges in the triangle of visibility (see diagram); they must be maintained at a **maximum height of 3.0' (91 cm)** and their branches **must** <u>not</u> **grow over the sidewalk** or the street (if there are no sidewalks) so as to ensure a clear view of the corner.



POOLS AND SPAS

The City of Pointe-Claire pays particular attention to the safety of pools and spas. Prior to purchasing your equipment, please contact us at 514-630-1206 or visit our website at www.ville.pointe-claire.qc.ca for the applicable regulation.

Important: Please note that inflatable and temporary swimming pools (with a depth of water greater than 45 cm–18") must meet the same requirements as a conventional swimming pool with a certificate of authorisation issued prior to its installation.

RESIDENTIAL CABANAS (SHEDS) – REMINDER

Prior to the construction or the installation of a cabana, a building permit application should be made to ensure compliance to the municipal zoning and construction regulations (minimum setbacks, maximum height and floor area, type of foundation, etc.). Please note that although a building permit is not required for a cabana with an area of 12 m² (129 sq. ft.) or less and without a permanent foundation, the municipal regulations must still be respected.

CALL BEFORE YOU DIG, BE A GOOD NEIGHBOUR, PLAY IT SAFE



In virtually every neighbourhood lies a vast underground network of telephone, television and hydroelectric cables and natural gas lines – sometimes only centimetres beneath the surface.

For your safety and that of your neighbours, for underground telephone cables and gas lines locating services are available for free by calling INFO-EXCAVATION at 514-286-9228 or consulting their website at www.info-ex.com.

RESIDENTIAL ADAPTATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (RAAP)

Subsidies are currently available for the RAAP program. To find out if you are eligible and for more information, please contact Gestion des programmes S.H.Q. (responsible for the City of Pointe-Claire files) at 514-721-9814.

PROPANE TANKS

If you decide to install or modify the energy source of an apparatus (fireplace, pool heater, stove, heat pump, etc.) that is operated by propane gas, a certificate of authorisation or a permit is required for the installation of such equipment. Please submit two sets of plans with all pertinent information: certificate of location, tank type, capacity, height, location, details of screening, distance from the building and the openings, etc. Our by-law stipulates that a propane tank must be screened with a trellis-type fencing or with evergreens. An application form is available at the Planning Department to complete your file.

It is your responsibility as the property owner to ensure the conformity of all installations on your property. Do not hesitate to contact the Planning Department for more information at 514-630-1206.

Installing a propane tank without a certificate of authorisation? It's not worth the risk!

FENCES REQUIRE A CERTIFICATE OF AUTHORISATION

A certificate of authorisation is required for the installation of a fence. Two copies of construction drawings and a copy of the certificate of location for your house must be submitted with your application form to the Planning Department.

A Celebration of our Architectural Heritage

The 23rd edition of the Montréal Architectural Heritage Campaign (OPAM), organized jointly by the City of Montreal and Heritage Montreal, will be held this year from September 20 to October 6, 2013, and will coincide with the Journées de la culture.

The objective of this event is to pay tribute to property owners who have distinguished themselves through the conservation and maintenance of their buildings, as well as to promote the importance of preserving our built heritage as a legacy for future generations.

In 2012, Mrs. Donna Gould-Landry and Mr. Ronald Landry were bestowed the esteemed heritage award in the residential category for their meticulous work at maintaining and preserving this lovely heritage home situated at 14 Waverley Avenue. Their 1952 red clay brick bungalow features many of its authentic architectural elements, including the imposing chimney, the front door adorned with three square window inserts and a decorative wood trim, the original wooden windows, wooden shutters with S-irons placed underneath, and a glass-block window on the lateral wall. This house pays homage to its builders and artisans and is the pride and joy of the owners and the community.

For the 2013 Montréal Architectural Heritage Campaign, a number of free activities will be offered to the residents of the City of Pointe-Claire. ÉNGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENTS



BUSINESS HOURS FOR THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department is open Monday to Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. from May 6 to September 2, 2013, for the summer schedule. You can reach our Department at 514-630-1230; outside business hours, please dial the Public Security number at 514-630-1234, on weekends and statutory holidays.

CLOSING AND OPENING OF RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL WATER ENTRANCE SERVICE

Our Department offers the service of having your main water entrance opened or closed. Unless it is an emergency, for interruption of service due to repairs or renovations on your water pipes, you should give us at least **48 hours** notice before starting the work. It is necessary for us to verify your water entrance's condition. Dial **514-630-1230** between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to reach us.

The service is offered free of charge during regular hours (Monday to Friday between 7:30 a.m. and 12:20 p.m. and between 1:00 and 4:30 p.m.). If the work has to be done at any other time, the charges will be **\$285 plus taxes**. For an emergency on weekends and statutory holidays, you can dial 514-630-1234.

SEWER CLEAN-OUT

The sewer clean-out located inside your home must be accessible and in good condition. The cap must not be covered with cement, rust or any other material and easy to manipulate. It must also be located where the sewer pipe exits the house (usually near the water meter) and have a 45° angle in order to permit the insertion of a rigid rod used for unblocking.



SERVICE CALLS FOR SEWER BLOCKAGES

The Public Works Department offers, upon request, a service to clear a blocked sanitary sewer. If the responsibility (when the blockage occurs between the building and the City limit) is incumbent upon the property owner, a flat rate of **\$585** plus applicable taxes will be charged if the work is done during regular hours (from Monday to Friday, between 7:30 a.m. and 12:20 p.m. and between 1:00 and 4:30 p.m.). If the work has to be done at any other time, the charges will be **\$770**.



The phone number to dial during regular working hours is 514-630-1230, and **514-630-1234 after hours**, on weekends and statutory holidays.

BURNED-OUT STREET LIGHTS

If the street light in front of your house has burned out, please call the City at the number 514-630-1208. Kindly give the street name, house number, or street light pole number. The light will usually be repaired in the following days (all street poles are numbered).

BACKFLOW STOP-CHECK VALVE

Over the past few years, municipal by-laws have required homeowners of new or already existing buildings to ensure that their sewer line is equipped with a backflow stop-check valve (on the private side). These valves prevent basement flooding should there be a sewer or pluvial back-up.

However, extra care needs to be taken in order to ensure that your stop-check valve remains functional.

- 1. Check regularly that the valve is not stuck in an open position due to an obstruction or malfunction.
- 2. In case of heavy rain showers or rapidly melting snow, you must avoid running water or flushing toilets. This input of water can open the stop-check valve, causing water from the sewer to back up.

Helpful tip: Ask for added sewer back-up protection from your home's insurance provider. Providers often demand a minimum annual fee for this kind of protection, which could save you a lot of trouble should you suffer damages from flooding due to sewer blockage.

Also, please note that for all changes, additions, or questions relating to this matter, you must contact the Planning Department at 514-630-1206.

FREE REMOVAL OF BRANCHES

The service of removal of branches is performed by employees of the City of Pointe-Claire, free of charge, from the beginning of April until the end of October. Residents wishing to make use of the service are asked to call the Public Works Department at 514-630-1230, giving their name and address. The branches are usually collected within a delay of 30 days.

IMPORTANT: To take advantage of this service, branches must be placed in an ordered bundle, with the cut end towards the street. The branches should not measure more than four feet long (120 cm) and 2½ inches (6,25 cm) in diameter. Hedge clippings and shrubs (without the roots) are accepted.

Residents are requested not to include items such as iron bars, wire, etc., in the branch piles. If these objects are not detected, they can cause serious injury to the employees operating the machine and major damage to the equipment.

Residents wishing to obtain chips produced from the branch collection may come to the parking lot of the Public Works Department located at 50 Terra-Cotta Avenue. The chips are available from April to October at all times, without any charge.

SPECIAL PICK-UPS

For a fee, the Public Works Department offers a special pick-up service for your construction materials (wood, brick, drywall, etc.), excavation materials (earth, sand, stones, rocks, asphalt and cement) and residential renovation materials (with the exception of those originating from multifamily dwellings). Simply call the Public Works Department for a free estimate at 514-630-1230 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. from Monday to Friday.

N.B. Tires and household hazardous waste will not be accepted

VANDALISM OF ELECTRICAL WIRES

Recently, the City of Pointe-Claire was subject to a kind of theft which is becoming more common: the theft of copper in electrical wires of lighting systems found in the City's parks and streets. The thieves vandalize the underground wires connecting the individual lampposts, disrupting lighting in parks and streets.

The City of Pointe-Claire is asking for your cooperation to help prevent such incidents. Should you notice any suspicious activity on or near the City's electrical installations, we ask that you call Pointe-Claire's Public Security Department at 514-630-1234. Be advised that the City of Pointe-Claire does not perform any electrical work on these systems outside of office hours, save for exceptional cases.

We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

DRAINAGE DITCHES AND PREVENTION OF PROPERTY FLOODING

Drainage, boundary and division ditches and streams on private properties are extremely important to help prevent flooding in your backyard or excess water on your landscaping.

Many property owners neglect their duties in this matter and consequently their neighbours suffer very unpleasant flooding during snow melt and heavy rains. At such times, the City receives many requests for help, which, in the long run, costs more to the taxpayer because such problems must be studied to locate the source of the blockage.

The City of Pointe-Claire wishes to remind you that the property owner is entirely responsible for the cleaning and maintenance of any drainage, boundary or division ditch and stream located on his or her property. The property owner is required

to clean and keep these ditches free of any obstruction or blockage of any sort. Moreover, the civil code of Québec requires that the property owner maintain these installations in such condition as to allow adequate drainage and a free flow of water coming from properties located at a higher elevation.

Failure to maintain standards renders the property owner liable, and he or she could be fined as ordered in by-laws 341, 341-1, and 420. Moreover, the City may intervene according to these by-laws and invoice the property owner for the cost of cleaning these ditches.

Fortunately, the majority of residents respect these laws and regulations for the benefit of all their fellow citizens, and we are grateful to them for doing so.

GARAGE SALE SAFETY

You're probably thinking, "You're kidding, right? Garage sale safety?" Well, no! Think about it for a minute; it makes sense.

The best garage sale in years is being held on your street. Cars galore, and you can't get out of your own driveway, and there is precious little room to pass for emergency vehicles. Something to consider, right?

Also consider the location of your sale. Is it truly a garage sale, or a moving sale? Will people be circulating through your home? If so, then do areas of your home have to be sealed off or do you have someone to escort your potential buyers through your home? The normal garage sale does take place, in fact, in a garage or driveway, but may create an interesting scenario if someone needs to use the "facilities" or a telephone. For those who have to "go", it may seem rude or careless to refuse, but most often you really don't know who you are letting in your home. So politely refuse their request. As for the telephone, if you can have one outside, great, but if your only option is an indoor telephone, then again politely refuse any request.

Not everyone who shows up on your doorstep is a potential thief, most people are just looking for a bargain. And it is a great way to spend a Saturday morning. However, thieves have been known to "help themselves" to various small articles around a home or to make mental notes to return at a later date. The popular saying "better safe than sorry" applies here. It doesn't cost a thing to be careful and alert. Take care to make your property safe for all. Negligence on your part, in case of any accident, could be costly. Check with your insurance company first, just to be sure.

Please take note that the by-law concerning garage sales is quite specific and should be adhered to. Only two (2) sales a year are permitted for each dwelling. The sale shall not last more than one day and shall not be held other than between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. So, remember, if a public security van pulls up at your garage sale this year, the inspector is there with your best interest and safety in mind.

SPEAKING OF SECURITY, A REMINDER...

Please remember that it is prohibited to use a public street to engage therein in any game or sport.

Your safety is important to us.

DOG BY-LAW DID YOU KNOW...

The Pointe-Claire Public Security Department is responsible for taking care of problems concerning animal control in the City and the enforcement of its by-law 2568 concerning dogs.

Proper dog control and behaviour is the responsibility of the owner (or the custodian). Public Security will answer calls concerning stray/wandering dogs, dogs not held on a leash, dogs barking so as to be a nuisance to the residents of the neighbourhood, or dog owners who neglect to pick up their dog's defecation. Failing to observe the by-law could mean a fine for the dog owner (or the custodian).

Please remember that, according to the by-law, all dogs must be registered at City Hall by obtaining a licence every year for every dog. A list of dog registrations is given to Public Security for easier identification, should a dog be found wandering.

Furthermore, the **by-law concerning parks and public places** states that it is forbidden for any person visiting or frequenting a park:

- to bring in any animal unless on a leash;
- to take any animal into a public shelter or children's play area.

If you would like to walk your dog freely and let him run, two dog runs are available for this activity. One is located on the southwest side of Terra-Cotta Park, close to the parking lot on Terra-Cotta Avenue. The second one is located in the northern part of Ovide Park, at the end of Lakeside Avenue.

IT IS SUMMER – DRIVERS, BE AWARE!

The City of Pointe-Claire, members of Council and the Public Security personnel wish to invite motorists to slow down this summer. With the arrival of warmer weather we must all focus on the changes we must bring to our driving habits.

In 2007, Pointe-Claire took steps to reduce the speed limit to 40 km per hour. Around schools and parks, the limit goes down to 30 km per hour. It is vital that this speed be respected for the protection of all our citizens.

Cyclists come in all ages and have a right to share the streets with all other vehicles. However, cyclists are often not aware of traffic approaching from behind. This is especially true of younger cyclists. Drivers must also be aware that some children will run into the street without thinking.

THE LINK BETWEEN SPEED AND ACCIDENTS

The risk of accidents increases with speed. At high speed, the driver has less time to process information and to react. Moreover, higher speeds lead to an increase in the braking distance: the higher the speed, the higher the braking distance. Thus, it becomes difficult to avoid an accident. Figure 1 – Survival chances for pedestrians according to the speed at time of impact

A simple example: at a speed of 30 km/h, a careful driver barely has time to stop in front of a child who falls on the pavement 13 metres away. At a speed of 40 km/h, the braking distance is 19 metres and the motorist's speed is still 36 km/h when he (or she) hits the child, a difference of 6 metres, which, for a child, may be a question of life or death...



Figure 2 – Braking distance and speed of impact at 30 and 40 km/h

Increased awareness on everyone's part will avoid accidents and make our streets safer for all.

BACKYARD FIRE PITS AND THE USE OF EXTERIOR FIREPLACES AND WOOD BURNING STOVES ARE PROHIBITED AND ARE SUBJECT TO A \$1,000 FINE

The *Communauté métropolitaine de Montréal's (CMM)* Environment Department reminds us that, according to by-law 90 relating to the protection of air quality, it is prohibited to use these devices on the whole *Communauté* territory, including the 82 member municipalities.

PDQ 5 is now offering "Projet NUMÉRO" to the citizens of Pointe-Claire and Dorval. This initiative aims to decrease bicycle theft as well as trace the owners if their bikes are found.

With an appointment, citizens can go to the PDQ 5 with their bikes to have them marked. The number entered will be stored in a register and a sticker will be put on the bicycle. If a bike is found with that number, the owner is automatically contacted, no matter where the bicycle is found on the Island of Montreal. In fact, each year, several bicycles recovered are never returned to their owner because they are not identified.

Marking sessions will be offered during the summer near cycling trails and they will be announced on the website of the SPVM PDQ 5.

DOMESTIC GARBAGE COLLECTION



- Every Wednesday.
- Between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.
- The service is provided by the company Camille Fontaine et fils inc.
- Garbage is transported to the Raylobec transfer station located in Vaudreuil before being sent to the BFI landfill site located in Lachenaie.

The Public Works Department would like to remind its residents that the City's garbage by-law states that refuse must not be put out for collection earlier than 6:00 a.m. on the morning of the collection day, provided that the garbage is placed in plastic bags. If it is in rigid plastic or metal containers with the proper covers, these containers can be placed at the curb for collection after 9:00 p.m. the night prior to collection day.

A FEW IMPORTANT REMINDERS ABOUT THE GARBAGE COLLECTION:

 Materials must be placed in a reusable plastic or metal container that does not exceed 100 L in volume or in a conventional plastic bag (for manual collection).

OR

- Materials must be placed in a reusable plastic container that does not exceed 360 L in volume (for mechanical collection).
- For manual collection, bags or containers that exceed
 55 lbs (25 kg) in weight will not be picked up.
- For mechanical collection, containers that exceed 200 lbs (91 kg) in weight will not be picked up.
- A maximum of 6 items bags or bins (the equivalent of six bagfuls for reference) will be picked up at each doorway.

RECYCLABLE MATERIALS COLLECTION

- Every Tuesday.
- Between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.
- The service is provided by the company Entreprise Sanitaire F.A. Itée.
- Materials are sent to the Complexe environnemental de Saint-Michel sorting centre in Montreal.

A FEW IMPORTANT REMINDERS ABOUT THE COLLECTION OF RECYCLABLE WASTE:

- Bins can be placed outside the evening before, after 9:00 p.m., or before 7:00 a.m. on collection day.
- $-\,$ Only recyclable waste placed in the bin will be picked up. $-\,$ The placing of your bin must respect the requirements
- for mechanical/robotized collection. - The cover of your bin must be completely closed.

IMPLEMENTATION OF OUTDOOR RECOVERY UNITS: PHASE II



While in 2009 the City undertook its first implementation phase of recovery units for recyclable materials in some parks and public green spaces within its territory, the City is proud to announce the completion of the project's second and final phase in the spring.

This initiative is part of the City's ongoing efforts to pursue sustainable development, continue improving residual matter management as well as preserve the quality of our environment.

It should be noted that these units are intended for recyclable materials (paper, cardboard, glass, plastic, metal) only. Keep your eyes open for this new recycling unit!

GREEN AND KITCHEN WASTE (COMPOSTABLE MATERIALS)

- Every Tuesday.
- Between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.
- The service is provided by Camille Fontaine et fils inc.Materials are transported to the Raylobec transfer
- station located in Vaudreuil before being sent to the Mironor composting centre located in Lachute.



IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- The City wishes to remind you that it is prohibited, since last year, to use plastic and compostable bags (except for paper bags) for this collection.
- Furthermore, because of the ministerial decree in connection with the emerald ash borer (April 2012), only evergreen branches will be collected in this collection program if they are under 1 m in length and under 5 cm in diameter. They should be tied in bundles with string or rope, unless placed in a container.
- However, we remind you that you can dispose of your branches (hardwood or evergreen), free of charge, through the branch shredding service provided by City employees from the beginning of April until October 31st. Residents wishing to make use of this service are asked to call the Public Works Department by dialling 514-630-1230 and give their name and address. The branches are usually collected within 30 days.

Important: To qualify for this service, branches must be placed in an orderly fashion by the street (cut extremity pointing toward the street) and should not measure more than four feet long (120 cm) and 2½ inches (6.25 cm) in diameter. Hedge remnants and small trees can be collected, provided the roots have been removed.

Residents are requested not to include items such as iron bars, wires, etc., in the branch piles. If these objects are not detected, they can seriously injure employees operating the machine and damage the equipment.

Residents wishing to obtain chips produced from the branch collection may come to the parking lot of the Public Works Department located at 50 Terra-Cotta Avenue. The chips are available from April 15 until October 31st at all times, free of charge.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION





Pointe-Claire is once again the city that recovered the largest amount of green waste out of all the West Island communities within the territory of the Agglomeration of Montreal. Since 2009, Pointe-Claire residents have been recovery program leaders in the West Island. Congratulations to all participants and have a great 2013 season!

COMPOSTING, GRASSCYCLING AND LEAF SHREDDING... SENSIBLE SOLUTIONS TO MANAGE YOUR GREEN WASTE AT HOME!

Although the City of Pointe-Claire offers door-to-door collection of compostable materials, the City encourages the following activities.

COMPOST AT HOME...

If you do not yet have a home composter, the best time to start would be in the spring. Consult the document entitled *Composting at home* on the City's website (www.ville.pointe-claire.qc.ca, section: Public Works, tab: Residual matter).

DOMESTIC COMPOSTERS FINANCING PROGRAM

Domestic composters are also available for a modest price from the Public Works Department. Pointe-Claire residents who want a composter are asked to complete the order form below. Cash will not be accepted. **The composters are distributed at the reception desk**.

GRASSCYCLING AND LEAF SHREDDING... IT'S VERY INEXPENSIVE AND EFFECTIVE!



- With recent developments in the municipal collection of compostable materials and, notably, the prohibition of plastic bags, grasscycling and the mulching of leaves are establishing themselves as effective, inexpensive and ecological solutions for managing these types of materials.
- Did you know that green waste (grass cuttings, leaves, etc.) represents close to 20% of municipal garbage and is the main cause of contamination of sanitary landfills? Thus, grasscycling and the mulching of leaves allow the burial of grass cuttings and leaves to be reduced by 300 to 900 metric tons per year! For 2013, adopt this ecological practice... because every gesture counts!
- Grasscycling consists of leaving grass cuttings on the lawn to allow them to decompose directly into the ground.
- The *mulching of leaves* consists of mowing or mulching fallen leaves to allow them to decompose directly into the ground. Many models of lawn mowers are equipped with a mulching blade to facilitate this task. However, if you do not have this type of blade at your disposal, you can simply mow over the same spot two or three times. If possible, avoid passing over the leaves when they are damp. This will simplify the work and keep material from accumulating under the mower.

ADVANTAGES OF THESE ECOLOGICAL PRACTICES:

- They reduce the amount of materials collected during municipal collection programs.
- They provide your lawn with a natural fertilizer.
- They protect the soil from dryness and thus reduce watering times.
- They allow you to save time and money.

ECOCENTRE

As in the past, it is also planned for 2013 that the Ecocentre collection days continue.

The dates and details of the program are available in the information guide that you received by mail in early May or on the City's website (www.ville.pointe-claire.qc.ca, section: Public Works, tab: Residual matter).

In 2012, the service was provided by the company Kadisal inc. and the various recovery centres responsible for recycling, reuse and material recovery were: Centre de tri Meli-Max, 100% Environmental, Eco-vente, AIM, and Centre de tri du Complexe environnemental de Saint-Michel.

DOOR-TO-DOOR COLLECTION OF BULKY ITEMS: IT'S BACK AGAIN!

IMPORTANT INFORMATION



Remember that HHWs are harmful to the environment when they are thrown in with household waste or when they are spilled in sewers. In addition, they are dangerous and toxic to health and very often are the primary cause of infant intoxications. It is, therefore, crucial to recognize them and to get rid of them properly.

We would also remind you that several retailers* also offer recovery services for paints, used oils, rechargeable batteries, medications, etc. To find the recovery locations nearest you, visit the City's website at www.ville.pointe-claire. qc.ca (Public Works section, Residual Matter tab – HHW).

A FEW TIPS

- Reduce the source of your HHW consumption by not purchasing more than required and by using ecological alternatives.
- Favour the purchase of rechargeable batteries and return them to participating merchants once their useful life has ended.

* Regulations on the recovery and recycling of products by companies, in force since July 14, 2011, places responsibility on enterprises' shoulders for affected products they sell on the Quebec market, and until final disposition thereof, at the end of their useful life. (From the definition of Recyc-Québec.)

ORGANIZATION OF BINS FOR DONATED ITEMS AND REUSABLE CLOTHING

On April 2, 2013, the City of Pointe-Claire implemented a policy for organizing charity bins in its territory. This measure was deemed necessary given the increasing number of bins placed in Pointe-Claire and in order to harmonize this sector of activities within our territory as much as possible. It should be noted that this policy applies only to bins stored on public (municipal) property.

Given this situation, we wish to inform you that a single public site has been chosen to receive and store these bins at the Bob-Birnie Municipal Arena, located at 58 Maywood Avenue (H9R 0A7). The bins will be stored at the south end of the building and parking lot.



For several years, the City has supported organizations working in this field and has tried to maintain a healthy and constructive relationship with its various partners. The City does not intend to exercise favouritism in this case. However, it does require that charitable organizations be recognized at the provincial level and that they demonstrate that donations collected on our territory are devoted primarily to serving the interests of the Quebec community.

This initiative forms part of the objectives of the 2010-2015 waste management policy of the Quebec government, as well as the 2010-2014 waste management plan of the Montreal agglomeration. It is intended to provide better support for social economy companies and to clarify and reinforce mechanisms for reusing materials within the community.

Important: Only what is placed inside the bins will be taken by these organizations. Bulky items or materials that don't fit in the bins should instead be brought to the Ecocentre or to any other accredited materials recovery centre.

THE GREEN PATROL IS BACK FOR A SIXTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR!

The City of Pointe-Claire is pleased to announce the return of environmental safety practitioners in its territory for the summer. They have a mission to educate the Pointe-Claire residents on various environmental issues by providing tips and tricks that help residents take concrete, pro-environmental action. For the sixth consecutive year, the Green Patrol will cruise city streets on bicycles or in the patrol car and will gladly answer questions from residents.

This year, the Green Patrol will pay particular attention to responsible waste management. Specifically, it will check the containers at the curb on collection day in order to identify any problems. The Patrol may speak to people or simply leave information documents in mailboxes to raise awareness of good environmental practices.

WHY THE PATROL?

Every week, the various sorting and waste treatment centres receive unwanted objects that slow down and complicate operations, in addition to affecting quality; for example, diapers, sanitary napkins, bricks, dead animals, plastic bags, rocks, animal feces, etc.

Many Quebec municipalities, including Sherbrooke, Saguenay, Magog, Montréal, Longueuil, and Laval have had green patrols for several years. And it brings in results; this special contact with residents provides answers to their questions about waste management.

By educating residents, the City of Pointe-Claire has been able to give a second life to around 10,000 tonnes of recyclable materials annually, thereby reducing waste sent to landfill. Our awareness squad will patrol city streets until mid-August. Lastly, we should mention that in addition to encouraging our faithful sorters in their team effort for sound waste management, the patrol will also pay special attention to environmental programs, including saving water, grasscycling and preventive measures for ragweed.

CLAIMS – PROCEDURES TO FOLLOW

If you suffer damages during an accident, be it bodily injuries or damages to your property (e.g.: fall on an icy sidewalk, sewer back-up, etc.) and you believe that the City is responsible for such accident, these are the steps to follow for being legally able to submit your claim before a tribunal:

- Within fifteen (15) days from the date of an accident resulting in property damages, a written notice must be sent to the Legal Affairs, Communications and City Clerk's Office Department of the City of Pointe-Claire, 451 Saint-Jean Boulevard, Pointe-Claire (Québec) H9R 3J3 (Tel.: 514-630-1200). Such notice must contain the particulars of your claim so as to allow the municipality the opportunity to review the circumstances. It is not necessary, at this stage, to specify the amount of your claim. You should send your notice through certified or registered mail. Failing such notice, the municipality is relieved from any liability for any damages caused by the accident, any provision of the law notwithstanding.
- 2. In the case of bodily injury resulting from an accident for which you would intend to claim from the City, such notice is not legally required, but we strongly recommend that you send it nonetheless, since it would help in processing your claim in a timely manner.
- 3. No legal action before the courts for damages against the City shall be valid unless such action is instituted within six (6) months after the day on which the accident happened. In the case of bodily injury, the law set that delay to three (3) years.

Hopefully, you will never have to use this procedure, but if you are victim of circumstances for which you believe the municipality to be responsible, make sure that these steps are followed so as to avoid any unpleasant surprise before the court when comes the day of the hearing.

"Commemorative park benches"

Are you a resident of Pointe-Claire who wishes to commemorate an event, a person worthy of mention, a wedding anniversary or the death of a close one? You can now purchase a commemorative park bench. The prices are established according to the current regulation PC-2804, p. 57, appendix II-14 for year 2013. The prices are:

- From \$1,090 plus all applicable taxes (\$1,253.23) for the bench and its transport and installation on an existing concrete base (or concrete pavers) and the installation of the commemorative plate;
- From \$1,810 plus all applicable taxes (\$2,081.05) for the bench and its transport and installation on a new concrete base and the installation of the commemorative plate. The text and the plate should be supplied by the applicant as stipulated in the "Commemorative park bench policy".

APPLICATION FOR A CERTIFICATE OF AUTHORISATION FOR FELLING A TREE ON A PRIVATE PROPERTY

Any application for a certificate of authorisation for felling a tree on a private property will require a copy of the certificate of location of the applicant's property.

This procedure is designed to certify that the tree is located on the applicant's property. It will also avoid any possible disagreements between the applicant and any owner of a nearby lot for a tree situated near property limits.

A certificate of authorisation is required for cutting down any tree with a trunk diameter of 10 centimetres

(4 inches) or more. An inspector will then proceed to inspect the tree.

Please allow one to three weeks for the issuing of the certificate of authorisation.

We wish to remind you that in order to file a request for a tree cutting permit, you can obtain the proper form at the Parks and Horticultural Division at 94 Douglas-Shand Avenue, 2nd floor.







POINTE-CLAIRE SWIM TEAM IS ON A ROLL!

After an excellent start to the season with record-breaking performances at **Brantford Swim International** in Ontario and **Paul Bergen International** in Portland, Oregon, the Pointe-Claire Swim Team continued its momentum by dominating the championships in February.

The first real challenge was the **Eastern Championships** held in Montreal. During this competition, a delegation of 38 senior PCSC athletes battled the best teams in the country. Their hard effort showed in the excellent results: first place for women and a combined victory for men and women. The Western Championships took place on the same weekend in Western Canada and the results for both championships were combined. For the first time in our history, the Pointe-Claire Swim Team won the dual **East-West title**, ahead of rival teams in Toronto, Edmonton and Calgary.

The other challenge facing PCSC was the **Provincial Age Group Championships** in Gatineau, Quebec. For the 11th consecutive year, PCSC won this meet, this year with 1300 points, which was 1000 points ahead of our nearest competitor. What really stood out is that the team performed better than last year, with an average of 25 points per swimmers compared to 18 points per swimmer in 2012.

Pointe-Claire Swim Team has had a great season so far and it is looking to continue its success at the upcoming competitions: Team Champs in April in Montreal, Top Cup championships in Etobicoke in May, P1 and P2 provincial championships in June, and Age Group Championships in July. **The Senior Summer National Championships** are also taking place in July, here at the Pointe-Claire Aquatic Centre from July 17 to 20.

Tryouts for the swim team for the 2013-2014 season will take place on the following dates: August 12, 13 and 19 from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. (or by appointment, 514-630-1202, ext. 1403). All swimmers are invited to try out! We look forward to seeing you. PCSC offers its swimmers the unique opportunity of being part of one of the best teams in Canada in one of the nicest Olympic-size pools in the country.





The Pointe-Claire Skating Club experienced another wonderful season in 2012-2013. We welcomed over 500 skaters of all levels, ranging from preschoolers to competitive figure skaters. We have a very popular "KidSkate" program designed for preschoolers, aged 3 to 5 years old, featuring a "learn-through-play" approach. "CanSkate" is our recreational program, intended for children aged 5 years and older. This year we will be implementing the soft approach to Skate Canada's "New CanSkate" program, that teaches beginners basic learn-to-skate skills through the use of circuits.

Our Junior Group program is for skaters who have completed badge 4 and up. This program is geared toward new junior skaters through preliminary levels. It encompasses stroking, skills, dance and freestyle elements (e.g., jumps, spins and footwork). Several of our skaters will be testing their 1st dance this spring. At this level, we encourage skaters who have the desire to progress at a faster pace to take advantage of private lessons with any of our professional coaches.

Every year, we have children who, at the beginning of the season, can barely stand on skates; by the end of the season everyone is skating unassisted and having a great time in their classes. Each group is instructed by a "certified" Skate Canada coach and numerous program assistants.

This year, the Pointe-Claire Skating Club participated in a variety of different competitions, ranging from local skating competitions in Dorval, Vaudreuil and Beauharnois, Lac-St-Louis Regionals, to STARSkate provincial finals in St-Georges de Beauce, as well as international competitions in Burlington and Massena. Girl greatness starts here!

The Pointe-Claire Girl Guides welcomes new members any time of the year. Meetings are held on weeknights in various schools and community chalets in the area. The guide program strives to provide an environment where girls can relax and be themselves, feel a sense of belonging and make lifelong friends. For more than 100 years, Girl Guides of Canada-Guides du Canada has been the leading organization dedicated solely to girls. The Stewart Hall Art Gallery is pleased to present *Au fil des saisons*, an exhibition of Ingeborg Jürgensen Hiscox's most recent wood block prints. Hiscox's artistic career has been inextricably interwoven with her association with the Pointe-Claire Cultural Centre, Stewart Hall, first as an art teacher (1967-1976) and later as the director of the Stewart Hall Art Gallery from 1981 to 1989 and from 1991 to 1999.

Building on the unique qualities of the wood block print process, Hiscox manipulates the block in multiple ways, creating variations and limited editions. She often integrates drawn lines, written letters as well as real letters and threads stitched into the work to complete the print. In this exhibition, the artist has created a visual collage of prints and objects that encourage an intimate exploration of imagery, colour and texture.

Born in Germany, Hiscox completed her early art education in Munich, before immigrating to Canada. She attended Central Technical School in Toronto (1960-1963) and the École des beaux-arts in Montreal. After her three sons were all in school, Hiscox returned to university, receiving her Bachelor of Fine Arts, Concordia University (1979) and a Master of Art Education, McGill University (1992). Hiscox illustrated the award-winning children's book *Thomasina and the Trout Tree*, published by Tundra Books, and she was commissioned by the Lester B. Pearson International Airport, Toronto, to create a work titled *Skyward*. Hiscox has exhibited nationally and internationally. She is currently working at Atelier Glypto, in LaSalle, is a member of the printmaking studio Zocalo (Longueuil) and L'Atelier Circulaire (Montreal). She lives in Pointe-Claire, Quebec.

In 1916, when Colonel Charles MacLean built the mansion which now houses the Cultural Centre, it was given the name of Mull Hall after the MacLeans' ancestral seat on the Isle of Mull, Scotland. Although in 1963 the mansion was given the official name of Stewart Hall in honour of the Stewart Family who donated the building to the City of Pointe-Claire, the ties to the MacLean family remain a large part of the history of Stewart Hall.

This summer the Stewart Hall Art Gallery is pleased to host our first "Artist in Residence" with an Isle of Mull artist, Veronica Slater. For six weeks, from June 17 to July 28, Slater will set up her studio in the Project Room at the west end of the Gallery and bring together the "multiple histories" that link the Isle of Mull with Stewart Hall.

The artist writes: "Using old photographs, descriptions and the building itself I want to create a series of paintings and mixed media works that engage with the multiple histories that have occupied Stewart Hall. The aim is to probe the fabric of a residence so as to 're-stage re-represent' a sense of what is a past, present and future within the walls of what was once Mull Hall.

Charles MacLean was re-staging his own historical lineage to the ancestral clan seat of the MacLeans on The Isle of Mull when he immortalised Mull Hall. This geographical pull from a distant horizon provides another layer to a complex positioning of identities within a 'sense of place'."






