RESULTS

TELEPHONE SURVEY

Last fall, 706 residents took part in a telephone survey on their overall satisfaction with the frequency of our various collections.

Here are the results:



 Organic waste	weekly	97%
 Household waste collection	every other week	56%
	weekly during the summer	92%
 Seasonal leaf collection	11 collections	94%
 Ecocentre	once per month	93%
 Bulky items	once per month	92%
 Upholstered items	3 collections	90%

For the second year in a row, household waste will be collected every week this summer (details on page 12).

ASSESSMENT OF HOUSEHOLD WASTE SORTING

In 2018, the City hired a private firm to assess household waste sorting.

SORTING YOUR WASTE



ORGANIC AND RECYCLABLE WASTE

The Waste Management Squad will check organic and recyclable waste during the summer. The team will open bins at random before the collection in order to check their contents. The squad will place stickers on organic waste bins to acknowledge residents who have properly sorted their waste.



HOUSEHOLD WASTE

The City has once again hired a firm to check household waste in 2019. The waste will be picked up at random before the collection in each district in the spring, summer and fall. This data will help to better guide our awareness and communication initiatives in order to reach government targets.



WASTE SORTING AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

The results of the 2018 waste characterization study show that nearly half of household waste is in fact organic or recyclable (details on page 3). We have therefore asked Mr. Compost, along with Ms. Recycling and Mr. Waste, to help us sort our waste properly.

They will help you manage your waste starting this summer, so stay tuned.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR DOOR-TO-DOOR COLLECTIONS

HOW TO PLACE YOUR BINS AND CONTAINERS

- 1 Your rolling bins, waste containers, bags of leaves, and bulky and upholstered items must be placed at the end of your driveway, after 6 p.m. the day before the collection or before 7 a.m. on the day of the collection itself.
- 2 The wheels and handles of the rolling bin should face your home.
- 3 There should be a 30-centimetre (1-foot) free space around the rolling bin.

MAXIMUM WEIGHT PER BIN

for organic waste, recyclable materials, and household waste collections

BIN SIZE	MAXIMUM WEIGHT
80 litres	75 lb. (34 kg)
120 litres	110 lb. (50 kg)
240 litres	150 lb. (67 kg)
360 litres	220 lb. (100 kg)



PREVENT NUISANCES

- 1 **Keep your bins in good condition**
Wash your bins by spraying the outside and inside with white vinegar, then rinsing. It's important to let your bins dry before putting waste into them.
- 2 Keep your bins out of the sun and put them out every collection day, regardless of how full they are. Keep bins closed at all times.

FOR THE ORGANIC WASTE COLLECTION:

- 3 **Alternate between food scraps and dry materials**
Layer them separately in the bin and wrap your leftover meat, chicken, or fish in newspaper before putting them in the bin.
- 4 Place your leftover meat, chicken, or fish in the freezer or refrigerator until the day of the collection.



WHAT TO DO IF...

YOU NEED A SECOND BIN

Contact Public Works to get a second bin for organic or recyclable materials.

YOU NEED A DIFFERENT SIZE BIN

The City provides different sizes of bins for organic and recyclable materials. Contact Public Works.

YOUR WASTE WASN'T PICKED UP

Make sure collection instructions were followed: day and time, bin position, accepted container, container weight, accepted materials, etc. If all instructions were followed, report the situation to Public Works.

YOUR BIN PROVIDED BY THE CITY IS DAMAGED

Contact Public Works to have your bin repaired or replaced.

YOU WOULD LIKE WASTE MANAGEMENT TIPS

Contact Public Works to schedule an appointment with the **Waste Management Squad**. They are available from mid-May to mid-August to answer your questions over the phone or at your home.

ORGANIC WASTE

MONDAY – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. – **Weekly collection**

INSTRUCTIONS:

- ▶ Only 80-, 120- and 240-litre green rolling bins from the City are accepted. To obtain a second bin, contact Public Works at 514-630-1230 or tp@pointe-claire.ca.
- ▶ The bin must not weigh more than 150 lb (67 kg).
- ▶ The cover of the bin must be completely closed.
- ▶ Only organic materials placed in the rolling bin will be collected.
- ▶ Leaves placed in the green rolling bin are accepted in the collection.
- ▶ Bags of leaves are picked up only during the seasonal leaf collection (details on page 10).
- ▶ Only evergreen branches shorter than 1 metre in length and less than 5 cm in diameter will be picked up. They must be placed in the bin.

Plastic bags, even if they are identified as compostable or biodegradable, are not accepted.

ACCEPTED WASTE MATERIAL

KITCHEN WASTE (RAW, COOKED OR SPOILED)

- ▶ cereals, bread, pasta, nuts (including shells)
- ▶ coffee beans, filters and grounds, tea leaves, tea bags
- ▶ herbs and spices
- ▶ fruits and vegetables
- ▶ cakes, sweets, flour
- ▶ vegetable oils and fats (small amounts, in solid form or soaked up with paper or cardboard), sauces, salad dressing
- ▶ fish, seafood, meat and eggs (including shells and bones)
- ▶ solid dairy products

YARD WASTE

- ▶ tree branches (evergreens only) less than 1 metre in length and 5 centimetres in diameter
- ▶ small tree roots, household plants
- ▶ leaves, twigs, evergreen needles, wet sawdust, straw
- ▶ garden waste (flowers, fruit, vegetables, plants, weeds)
- ▶ grass clippings and other plants

OTHER WASTE MATERIAL

- ▶ cardboard (clean or soiled): pizza boxes, French fry containers, egg cartons
- ▶ cold ashes produced by burning untreated wood
- ▶ paper vacuum bags and their contents (human or animal hair, feathers, dust)
- ▶ toothpicks
- ▶ pet food
- ▶ paper (clean or soiled): tissue paper, paper towels, paper napkins, newspapers, muffin liners
- ▶ plates, bowls, and utensils made of wood, paper, or cardboard

KITCHEN CONE



Get a kitchen cone: it's a simple, effective way to collect food scraps using newspapers sections or advertising flyers. A larger size is available for multi-unit residential properties.

HOUSEHOLD COMPOST BIN



Get a household compost bin for \$25 and make your own compost from yard waste and some types of food scraps. Each residence can have a maximum of three household compost bins.

RAIN BARREL



Get a rain barrel for \$40. You'll be able to wash your car or water your garden without using drinking water. Each residence can have a maximum of three barrels.

Available at the multiservice counter at City Hall, open every Thursday until 7 p.m.

* The MULTI Card, available free of charge at the Library, Aquatic Centre, and the City Hall multiservice counter, is proof of residence that you can use to register for all City activities and access a range of City services, including the EcoCentre and distribution of trees, rain barrels, kitchen cones, and household compost bins. SEASONAL LEAF COLLECTION

MONDAY – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

SPRING

April 15 and 29

May 13 and 27

June 10

FALL

October 14 and 28

November 11 and 25

December 9

There will be the usual organic waste collection on these days, and you will also be able to put containers and bags filled with leaves at curbside.

ACCEPTED CONTAINERS:

- ▶ 80-, 120- and 240-litre green rolling bins provided by the City
- ▶ any reusable container provided by the City with a maximum volume of 100 litres
- ▶ cardboard boxes
- ▶ paper bags (with or without cellophane)

Plastic bags, even if they are identified as compostable or biodegradable, are not accepted.

Leaves are also accepted as part of the weekly organic waste collection. They should be put in the green rolling bin.



BRANCH COLLECTION ON REQUEST

May 1 to October 31

For quicker and more efficient service, please follow the new instructions below:

- ▶ Branches must be placed at curbside on your property.
- ▶ The cut end of the branches must be facing the street in order to make them easier to collect.
- ▶ There must not be any debris (soil, roots, metal, etc.) on the branches.
- ▶ The branches must be 10 centimetres (4 inches) or less in diameter. Larger branches are accepted at the Ecocentre (page 13).

- ▶ All branch piles must have a maximum height of 1.2 metres and must be spread out instead of stacked.

Please allow 21 days for this collection.

Branches cut off by a contractor hired to prune or fell a tree are the contractor's responsibility. For ash trees, please consult a contractor.

LEAF AND GRASS RECYCLING

Leaf and grass recycling are ecological practices that involve leaving shredded fallen leaves and grass clippings on the ground after mowing so that they can break down into the soil. Leaves and grass are natural fertilizers!



RECYCLABLES

MONDAY – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. – Weekly collection

INSTRUCTIONS

- ▶ Only 80-, 120-, and 360-litre blue rolling bins from the City are accepted.
- ▶ Only recyclable materials placed in the rolling bin will be collected.
- ▶ The cover of the bin must completely closed.
- ▶ Containers must be rinsed before you put them in the bin.

ACCEPTED MATERIALS

PAPER / CARDBOARD

- ▶ telephone directories, catalogues, magazines
- ▶ boxes: cereal, tissue paper, frozen foods, detergent, shoes, etc.
- ▶ flat and corrugated cardboard folded or cut-up cardboard boxes
- ▶ paper (including paper with staples or ink)
- ▶ envelopes (including those with windows)
- ▶ newspapers and circulars
- ▶ paper bags
- ▶ cardboard tubes and rolls



PLASTIC / GLASS / METAL

- ▶ metal cans, aluminum beverage cans, aluminum plates
- ▶ bottles, containers and jars (with or without labels)*
- ▶ milk and juice cartons, including Tetra Paks
- ▶ lids and caps
- ▶ plastic bags (that are not identified as biodegradable or compostable) **
- ▶ plastics numbered 1 to 5 and 7; look for the following symbol on the container or packaging to make sure it can be recycled:



* Remove lids and caps before placing them in your bin.

** Put all your plastic bags in one bag before putting them in the bin – this will make it easier to process them at the sorting centre.





HOUSEHOLD WASTE

TUESDAY – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. – **Collection every other week***

JUNE 4 TO AUGUST 29 – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. – **Weekly collection**

SECTOR A – TUESDAY / SECTOR B – THURSDAY

*Given land use, multi-unit residential properties have collections every week.


SECTOR MAP

SECTOR A

The entire area west of Saint-Jean Boulevard and the entire area south of Highway 20.

SECTOR B

The area that is both east of Saint-Jean Boulevard and north of Highway 20.



INSTRUCTIONS

Only household waste placed in a closed container or rolling bin will be picked up.

MANUAL COLLECTION

- ▶ Waste may be put in a reusable plastic or metal container, or a rolling bin, with a maximum volume of 100 litres per container or bin.
- ▶ The maximum weight for each container or bin is 55 lb. (25 kg).
- ▶ A maximum of 360 litres of household waste per door will be picked up at each collection.

MECHANICAL COLLECTION

- ▶ Waste may be put in a wheeled, reusable plastic container with a maximum volume of 360 litres.
- ▶ The rolling bin must not weigh more than 220 lb. (100 kg).

Construction materials are accepted at the Ecocentre only (page 13).
Waste that does not fit in the bin will be collected only with bulky items (page 14)
or upholstered items (page 15).

Materials are taken to sorting centres to determine what will be reused, recycled or reclaimed. Only non-recoverable waste is sent to landfill sites.

ACCEPTED MATERIALS

- ▶ appliances containing halocarbons (refrigerator, freezers, air conditioners, water coolers and dehumidifiers)
- ▶ computer equipment and electronic appliances
- ▶ motorized equipment (without fuel)
- ▶ household and bulky items
- ▶ sports equipment
- ▶ upholstered items (couches and mattresses)
- ▶ crystal, porcelain, ceramic
- ▶ excavation materials*
- ▶ household and electrical appliances
- ▶ ferrous and non-ferrous metals*
- ▶ tires and rims (separated)
- ▶ construction and renovation materials*
- ▶ remains of hardwood trees (branches, bark, chips)
- ▶ soil, rocks and sand
- ▶ fabrics and clothing

*Maximum size: 2.4 metres x 1.2 metres



DID YOU KNOW?

ACCESS TO ALL ECOCENTRES IN THE AGGLOMERATION OF MONTRÉAL

This is a service provided free of charge for a yearly maximum of 12 cubic metres. Beyond this amount, a fee will be charged.

CLOSEST ECOCENTRE: Saint-Laurent – 3535 Sartelon Street, Saint-Laurent

Hazardous household waste is accepted.

BULKY ITEMS: DOOR-TO-DOOR COLLECTION

WEDNESDAY – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

April 3, May 1, June 5, July 3, August 7, September 4 and October 2


Bulky items are non-upholstered items that are too big to be put in a bag, box, or garbage can. These objects are recovered and reclaimed when possible.

INSTRUCTIONS

- ▶ Items should not weigh more than 100 kg (220 lb.), and the maximum acceptable size is 1.8 metres (6 feet) by 1.2 metres (4 feet).
- ▶ Sharp or potentially dangerous items must be made safe.
- ▶ For each household, there is a maximum of 10 items, or the equivalent of 5 cubic metres, per collection.
- ▶ Whenever possible, materials should be tied up together.

ACCEPTED MATERIALS

- ▶ bathtubs, toilets, sinks
- ▶ propane barbecue grills (without the propane cylinder)
- ▶ electrical household appliances (except those containing refrigerant gas)
- ▶ large mirrors and sheets of glass
- ▶ furniture made of wood, metal, plastic or any other materials (tables, chairs, desks, dressers, bookcases, wardrobes, filing cabinets, etc.)
- ▶ electric baseboard heaters, kitchen range hoods, etc.
- ▶ doors and windows
- ▶ hot water tanks
- ▶ carpets (rolled)
- ▶ pool covers (rolled)

Sector A: May 1, July 3 and October 2





ACCEPTED MATERIALS

- ▶ upholstered chairs
- ▶ cushions
- ▶ mattresses, box springs
- ▶ sofas, armchairs



Items must be placed near the road after 6 p.m. the day before the collection or before 7 a.m. on the day of the collection itself.

INSTRUCTIONS

- ▶ Items should not weigh more than 100 kg (220 lb.), and the maximum acceptable size is 1.8 metres (6 feet) by 1.8 metres (6 feet).
- ▶ For each household, there is a maximum of 10 items, or the equivalent of 5 cubic metres, per collection.
- ▶ Whenever possible, cushions should be tied up together.

Some furniture stores will pick up your furniture and upholstered items when delivering new items. Ask about it to avoid accumulating furniture between collections!



HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD WASTE

SATURDAY AND SUNDAY – May 11 and 12, September 28 and 29
Between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., Civic-Center Avenue,
451 Saint-Jean Boulevard (parking lot behind City Hall)



ACCEPTED MATERIALS

- ▶ adhesives, tar, epoxy, paint remover
- ▶ aerosols
- ▶ intact fluorescent tubes and compact fluorescent lightbulbs
- ▶ lead-acid car batteries
- ▶ propane bottles
- ▶ engine oil, empty containers and filters
- ▶ vegetable oils
- ▶ mercury (thermometers)
- ▶ paint (latex, alkyde, enamel)
- ▶ pesticides and fertilizer
- ▶ batteries
- ▶ chemical products for pools
- ▶ cleaning and maintenance products
- ▶ turpentine, Varsol, gas, fuel, thinner, alcohol

CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

WEDNESDAY – January 8, 2020 – Between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

- ▶ All natural trees are accepted (fir, pine, spruce, birch).
- ▶ All decorations must be removed.
- ▶ The tree must be placed horizontally in the snow, near the road, after 6 p.m. the day before the collection or before 7 a.m. on the day of the collection itself.
- ▶ Trees are accepted up to the following maximum sizes:
 - Trunk diameter: 13 centimetres (5 inches)
 - Height: 2.5 metres (8 feet).

Collected trees are turned into wood chips or compost.

What to do if your tree has not been picked up?

- ▶ Trees are accepted at the Ecocentre (see page 13 for more details).

- ▶ clean containers

ACCEPTED ITEMS:

EXPANDED POLYSTYRENE

- ▶ protective packaging for electronic and household appliances
- ▶ coolers
- ▶ styrofoam cups

EXTRUDED POLYSTYRENE

- ▶ disposable plates and bowls
- ▶ trays for meat, fish and poultry
- ▶ fast-food containers
- ▶ egg packaging

Non-expanded polystyrene (number 6 plastic) is not accepted.



CORK NEW

Cork is collected at the following municipal buildings:

- ▶ City Hall (451 Saint-Jean Boulevard)
- ▶ Central Library (100 Douglas-Shand Avenue)
- ▶ Aquatic Centre (60 Maywood Avenue)



Program for recovering small electronic items (obsolete or non-functional) and ink cartridges.



ACCEPTED MATERIALS*

- ▶ chargers
- ▶ cables
- ▶ peripherals
- ▶ small ink cartridges
- ▶ small electronic items (cell phones, peripherals, digital cameras, MP3 and CD players, etc.)



*Only items that fit in the bin are accepted.
Placing items outside the bin is not allowed.



BATTERIES

Alkaline and cellphone batteries are collected in the following municipal buildings:

- ▶ City Hall
(451 Saint-Jean Boulevard)
- ▶ Central Library
(100 Douglas-Shand Avenue)
- ▶ Library – Valois Branch
(68 Prince-Edward Avenue)
- ▶ Aquatic Centre
(60 Maywood Avenue)
- ▶ Bob-Birnie Arena
(58 Maywood Avenue)
- ▶ Stewart Hall Cultural Centre
(176 Du Bord-du-Lac – Lakeshore Road)
- ▶ Canoe Club
(75 Du Bord-du-Lac – Lakeshore Road)

Only batteries that fit in the bin are accepted.
Remove batteries from your bags before placing them in the bin.



PILOT PROJECT: DIAPERS, FEMININE HYGIENE PRODUCTS, AND INCONTINENCE PRODUCTS

In a vision focused on sustainable development and in order to continue offering the best services, the City has implemented a new grant program for reusable diapers, feminine hygiene products, and incontinence products.

HOW TO OBTAIN THE GRANT

FOR WASHABLE DIAPERS:

You must fill out a form in advance (available at www.pointe-claire.ca) or in person.

Visit the multiservice counter at City Hall (451 Saint-Jean Boulevard).

Bring your MULTI Card (details on page 9), the original bill from a purchase made less than 6 months ago, and your child's birth certificate.

You could receive a grant of up to \$200 for the following products:

- ▶ washable diapers, washable swim diapers, permeable bags, and fabric to make diapers.

FOR FEMININE HYGIENE AND INCONTINENCE PRODUCTS:

You must fill out a form in advance (available at www.pointe-claire.ca) or in person.

Visit the multiservice counter at City Hall (451 Saint-Jean Boulevard).

Bring your MULTI Card (details on page 9), as well as the original bill from a purchase made less than 3 months ago.

You could receive a grant of up to \$100 for the following products:

- ▶ menstrual underwear and cups, washable sanitary napkins and reusable tampon applicators, washable underwear and liners for urinary leaks and incontinence, permeable bags;
- ▶ fabric to make underwear and liners for urinary leaks and incontinence.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ▶ Until a child is toilet trained, he or she will use approximately 6,000 diapers, which represents up to one tonne of waste.
- ▶ Disposable diapers are made of plastic (derived from crude oil) and cellulose (derived from wood). For one child, this is equivalent to half a barrel of crude oil and four and a half trees. Disposable diapers also require large quantities of water to be produced.
- ▶ One washable diaper is equivalent to around 300 disposable diapers.
